LEVELS EXPLAINED

The world of education is constantly changing so the following is a guide to what used to be called GCSEs or A levels.

Entry Levels, 1, 2 & 3

Entry levels are for beginners and ideal for anyone who wishes to gain a basic knowledge of a subject / study area. There are no formal entry requirements for these levels.

Level 1

A Level 1 course is the first fundamental step to gaining knowledge in a profession, job or industry. Students must demonstrate the ability to study at a Level 1 in English and maths.

Level 2

These intermediate courses require students to be working at Levels 1-2 in English and maths, depending on individual subject areas. Perfect for progression from a Level 1 course or for students who are not quite ready for a Level 3.

Level 3

Level 3 courses are for students who are looking to advance their education for employment and personal development. These qualifications are a gateway to higher education. Entry requirements are to have English and maths at Level 2 or GCSE English and maths at grade 4 (C grade).

Levels 4/5

These levels are the first steps into higher education. Levels 4 and 5 are needed for specific professional careers, or will enable to you to move into management roles.

- Degree apprenticeship
- Degree with honours for example bachelor of the arts (BA) hons, bachelor of science (BSc) hons
- · Graduate certificate
- Graduate diploma
- Level 6 award
- Level 6 certificate
- · Level 6 diploma

Level 7

- Integrated master's degree, for example master of engineering (MEng)
- Level 7 award
- Level 7 certificate

- · Master's degree, for example master of arts (MA), master of science (MSc)
- · Postgraduate certificate
- · Postgraduate certificate in education (PGCE)
- Postgraduate diploma



WHAT WILL I NEED TO ENROL?

Proof of ID

- British Citizens: passport, driving licence full or provisional, birth certificate (excluding bank statement, etc)
- Non-British Citizens: in-date passport, residence permit, visa (excluding driving licence)
- · National Insurance number

Other documents

- Proof of any previous or relevant qualifications
- Proof of income including and benefits
- Method of payment to cover any fees or deposits
- Proof of EHCP

FURTHER EDUCATION FUNDING – WILL I HAVE TO PAY?

If I am in receipt of JSA, ESA or any other benefit?

Most Entry Level, Level 1 and Level 2 courses are funded. This does depend on each individual course. Please speak to a member of our funding team for more information.

If I am aged 19-23?

The exemption rule means you are entitled to full funding for your first Level 2 and Level 3 course. Entry Level or Level 1 courses first are also fully funded.

If I am aged 19 plus?

Your first full Level 2 course will be funded if you are unemployed, as will enrolment onto Entry Level or Level 1 courses. Most Level 2 courses are funded if you are in receipt of benefits or have low earnings, otherwise you maybe able to get a 50% discount bursary.

If I am aged 24 plus and require funding for certain Level 3 courses?

You can apply for the Advanced Learner Loan. The Advanced Learner Loan is the most common way to fund one of our Access to Higher Education courses.

FREE* Adult English and Maths Functional Skills courses

These courses are free if you do not already hold either GCSE at C grade or higher (grade 4 or higher) or a Functional Skills Level 2.

Higher National Certificates (HNC) and Higher National Diplomas (HND) are job-related qualifications. HNCs and HNDs reflect the requirements of professional organisations and meet the National Occupational Standards for each sector or industry. They are an ideal choice for students seeking a cost-effective, vocational pathway to higher education.

CertEd - Level 5

The Certificate in Education (Further Education and Skills Sector) is a Level 5 teaching qualification which has a teaching/training practice requirement.

PgCE - Level 6


The Professional graduate Certificate in Education is a teacher training programme that will gain you a teacher training certificate in the postcompulsory sector.

BSc (Hons) - Level 6

A Bachelor of Science, BSc (Hons), is a bachelor's degree awarded for an undergraduate course or programme in science-based or technical studies.

How to make your cv and cover letter stand out from the rest, learn about useful tips and tricks when it comes to interviews.

Simple But Effective Ways to Make Your CV Stand Out

Start strong. Start with a summary of your skills and key accomplishments. This will attract the recruiter and grab their attention from the outset.

Emphasise results rather than responsibilities. Instead of just listing your past responsibilities, make your CV stand out by emphasising your results, using quantifiable data to show your accomplishments.

Customise for the job you want. Respond directly to the job description and explain exactly why you are the candidate for the role.

Demonstrate that you are connected. Whether it be at university or in past job roles, you will have met an array of different people. Make sure this comes through.

Show industry insight. An awareness of the industry you are applying for will show the recruiter that you have the ability to stay on top of trends.

Use power words. Using power words will emphasise your accomplishments and will give your CV additional impact.

RETRAINING - CHANGE IN CAREER

You may be at a point in your life where you are looking to change your career or needing to retrain to explore a different career route.

Things to consider

During your working career you would have developed many transferrable skills and experience that will support you in exploring alternative career opportunities. Although you may be required to start in a lower position that you have been in previously, you will be able to demonstrate your worth and abilities that could allow you to progress quicker within the industry.

You may need to undertake qualification to equip you in being able to undertake your new career route. Explore your options is key to this. Could you look at an apprenticeship, training programmes or adult courses? Is their any financial support available to support you. A lot of adult's do not realise that all of this is potentially available to you and worth exploring.

Financial it is likely that you are going to have to take a drop in your salary and for many this is a large factor into the decision that you will make. Again is it worth exploring the financial support that may be available to you. Along with considering if you can gain any qualifications prior to moving jobs. This may mean that you are able to gain a job which may pay a slightly

higher salary. Or look for a job similar job within the industry that you want to work within, and then you could explore side stepping into the desired position of your choice.

Not sure what to do next

You may think that completing a career quiz is only for school or college students. This is not the case. By completing a career quiz it will allow you to explore careers that you may not know existed or not had considered for yourself. Career guizzes take around 10 to 20 minutes and provides you with a list of jobs that you can then explore.

APPRENTICESHIPS

An apprenticeship is a program that trains a worker to become skilled in a particular trade. Apprenticeships combine hands-on work with classroom learning to train the apprentice. Apprenticeships are considered full-time employment.

How apprenticeships work

On an apprenticeship, you're employed to do a real job while studying for a formal qualification - usually for one day a week either at a college or training centre. By the end of your apprenticeship, you'll hopefully have gained the skills and knowledge needed to either succeed in your chosen career or progress onto the next apprenticeship level.

What you'll learn depends on the role that you're training for. However, apprentices in every role follow an approved study programme, which means you'll gain a nationally-recognised qualification at the end of your apprenticeship.

Apprenticeship levels

There are four different levels of apprenticeship:

- Intermediate equivalent to five good GCSE passes.
- Advanced equivalent to two A-level passes.
- Higher equivalent to the first stages of higher education, such as a foundation degree.
- Degree comparable to a Bachelors or Master's degree.

Age limit

There's no upper age limit on being an apprentice. As long as you're over 16 and have the right credentials, you'll be eligible to apply for your chosen apprenticeship. If you start your apprenticeship after you turn 19, you may be entitled to additional government funding.

Entry Requirements

To apply for an intermediate apprenticeship, you'll just need to be over 16 years old and no longer in full-time education.

For an advanced apprenticeship, you're likely to be asked for prior work experience and at least three 9-4 grade GCSEs or equivalent - such as an intermediate apprenticeship qualification.

As higher apprenticeships are the equivalent of a foundation degree, HNC or first year of a Bachelors, you'll usually need at least five 9-4 grade GCSEs, as well as some Level 3 qualifications in relevant subjects, to apply. Your Level 3 qualifications could be AS-levels, a BTEC National or a Level 3 NVQ.

Degree apprenticeships will have the tightest entry requirements. These may include three A-levels in a specified grade range or a higher apprenticeship qualification, on top of at least five 9-4 GCSE grades. It's also likely you'll be required to have prior work experience.
