1. GROUNDS FOR APPEAL - EXTENUATING CIRCUMSTANCES:

"Extenuating circumstances of which the Assessor/ Assessment Board was unaware and of which the student could not reasonably have been expected to inform the Assessment Board in advance."

Extenuating circumstances are defined as: "Circumstances beyond a student's control which could cause him or her to perform less well in coursework or examinations than he or she might otherwise have been expected to do and which affect the student for a significant period of time."

The following grounds for appeal will NOT be considered:

"The retrospective reporting of extenuating circumstances which a student might reasonably have been expected to disclose to the Assessment Boardbefore their meeting."

2. GROUNDS FOR APPEAL - PROCEDURAL IRREGULARITIES

"Procedural irregularities in the conduct of the Assessment/ Assessment Board (including alleged administrative error) of such a nature as to cause reasonable doubt as to whether the result might have been different had theynot occurred."

3. CHALLENGE TO ASSESSMENT GRADE

An appeal can be made against an students assessment grade if a student feels that an assessment grade has not been awarded fairly against the awarding bodies assessment criteria and requirements. They must be able to provide evidence that the assessor has not applied the criteria accurately.
